March 30 – May 8, 2026

England, Scotland, and the Stuart Kings

Instructor: Joseph Kicklighter

Tuesdays, 2:30 - 4:00 PM | Zoom

This course examines the 17th century and the development of Great Britain through the union of England and Scotland under the Stuart monarchy. The class will consider the growing power of Parliament, the English Civil War, the execution of Charles I, and the brief establishment of a republic. The course will also address Britain's continued expansion as a developing world empire during this period.

How America Became Great

Instructor: Michael Baker

Thursdays, 2:30 - 4:00 PM | Zoom

The twentieth century has often been called the "American Century." During this period, the United States emerged from two world wars as a dominant global power, shaped international economic systems, advanced scientific innovation, and influenced global norms. This course examines the political, economic, and institutional factors that contributed to America's rise. It will also consider current challenges, including political division, institutional strain, and questions of global leadership. Lectures will explore the elements that support national effectiveness and discuss areas that may strengthen democratic institutions and international influence moving forward.

Introduction to Islam

Wednesdays, 2:30 - 4:00 PM | April 1, 8, 15 | Zoom

This course provides an overview of the religion of Islam. Topics include the basic tenets of Islam; its primary sources (Quran, Sunnah, and Hadith); the life of Muhammad; and a brief history of the development of the faith. The course will also examine major Islamic sects and their origins, the concept of jihad, and Islamic perspectives on Jesus, Mary, and the People of the Book. The class will address common questions and consider Islam's role in the contemporary world. Designed for beginners, the course supports informed discussion and greater understanding of Islam within a global and interfaith context.

Local Naturalists

A team of local naturalists will guide this multi-disciplinary course, exploring topics such as botany, ichthyology, ornithology, geology, and ecology. Each instructor will share their unique expertise and observations, offering insights into our region's remarkable natural diversity. This course provides a deep dive into the natural world through the eyes of those who have spent years studying and appreciating the environment around us.

Wagner, Nietzsche and the Rise of Nazi Fascism

With Liberal Democracy under pressure from anti-democratic movements rising in many countries, it may be timely to examine the most extreme form of authoritarianism, Nazi Fascism. This class will follow the Grand Narrative of German cultural and political history, examining the origins of the Third Reich. We used to think that this path was unique to Germany, but today it seems clear that similar things can happen in established democracies as well. Along the way, we will take a look at Putin's authoritarian ideology and conclude by speculating on the anti-democratic tendencies in the contemporary world.

Whatever Happened to Folk Music?

Discover the origins and evolution of American folk and roots music, with special attention to African-American folk traditions and their commercial separation from Anglo-American folk music. Concertos, cantatas, sonatas, operas and many other types of pieces were first conceived in those years. In this music appreciation class, we will survey the music of the composers mentioned above, as well as several others who contributed much to the tradition of Western Classical Music.
